Special Shiur this Shabbos Morning

This Shabbos we will have the privilege of hearing a special shiur from 8:15 to 8:45am. Rav Yosef Carmel shlit"a, Av Bais Din and co-founder of the Eretz Chemda Institute, will speak on the topic of: The Re-establishment of Batei Din as part of the Process of Geulah.

Rav Yosef Carmel is the Av Bais Din of Eretz Chemda-Gazit, as well as Rosh Yeshiva of the Eretz Chemda Institute, a premiere institute for training dayanim in Eretz Yisroel. He is the author of Tzofenat Eliyahu, a commentary on the Vilna Gaon's commentary to Shulchan Aruch Choshen Mishpat, as well as co-author of Teshuvot B'Mareh HaBazak – a voluminous work of practical responsa based on the rulings of Rav Shaul Yisraeli zt"l.

Thought of the Week

The Midrash Rabbah notes that the opening of Parashat Kedoshim, the second parashah we read this week, restates the Aseret Ha'dibrot / Ten Commandments, albeit in a different order. There it says, "I am Hashem, your Elokim," and here (repeatedly), "I am Hashem, your Elokim." There, "You shall not have other gods," and here (19:4), "Molten gods you shall not make for yourselves." There, "You shall not take the Name of Hashem in vain," and here (19:12), "You shall not swear falsely by My Name." There, "Keep the day of Shabbat," and here (19:3), "My Sabbaths you shall observe." There, "Honor your father and your mother," and here (19:3), "Your father and mother you shall revere." [The midrash continues, showing parallels between our parashah and the second half of the Aseret Ha'dibrot.]

R' David Zvi Hoffman z"I (1843-1921; Rector of the Hildesheimer Rabbinical Seminary in Berlin) writes: The first five of the Aseret Ha'dibrot are listed in Parashat Kedoshim with the last two (honoring parents and Shabbat) appearing first because, to reach the highest level of kedushah / holiness [the subject of Parashat Kedoshim], one must start on the bottom rung. Honoring parents has been equated with honoring Hashem, and in order to reach the stage where one obeys Hashem unconditionally, one must start with honoring one's parents. One who would never commit an unseemly act in front of his best friend doesn't hesitate to do that thing when Hashem is watching. However, by honoring and fearing parents, one can develop the awe of Hashem. One should reflect that, just as one's parents watch over his every step, so Hashem is watching his every deed. (Peirush Al Sefer Vayikra).

"...the two of them shall be put to death..." (20:11)

Parshas Kedoshim contains the consequences that befall a person who engages in the prohibited consanguineous relationships. In the previous parsha, Acharei Mos, the Torah enjoins Bnei Yisroel from engaging in these relationships.[1] This reflects the Talmudic dictum "ein onshim elah im kein mazhirim" - "A punitive action is not meted out for the transgression of a prohibition unless there is a prior warning."[2] Why does the Torah divide the warnings and the punishments into two separate parshios?

A legal system which expects its citizens to abide by its laws for fear of the consequences that occur if the laws are broken is doomed to fail. If the only restraint is punishment, man will risk the negative consequences to attain the perceived benefits. Only a system which instructs its adherents to abide by the laws because transgression of them is inherently wrong and damaging to the individual, can be successful. Therefore, the Torah separates the directives enjoining us from engaging in these illicit acts from the consequences that accompany them to illustrate that we should not adhere to these rules out of fear of punishment, but because they are inherently destructive.
